SHOPPING with COUPONS

The Lopez family is at the supermarket. They're paying the cashier for their groceries. They have ten shopping bags of food for their family of five. The groceries they bought are expensive, but Ramona Lopez is smiling as she gives her money to the cashier. Why? Because she used coupons and saved more than \$70!

In fact, each month the Lopez family saves hundreds of dollars with coupons. Every week Ramona Lopez cuts coupons from the newspaper. Sometimes she buys several newspapers because each one has different coupons. She also looks on her computer and finds coupons on the Internet. There are some websites with hundreds of coupons. She only prints the coupons for grocery items she needs and puts those coupons in a special notebook.

According to Lopez, "There are coupons for everything! Just find coupons for your favorite products. You can spend a lot of money when you buy things you don't need. Before you go to the supermarket, make a grocery list and take coupons for just the items on your list."

According to some shoppers, a person can save 50% on groceries with coupons. And it takes only about 30 minutes a week. Here are some tips about coupons and smart grocery shopping.



- Know your favorite store. When does that store have newspaper coupons? What day of the week are different products on sale?
- Check supermarket advertising in the Sunday newspaper. There are usually a lot of coupons on Sunday.
- Find coupons on the Internet. Only print the ones you need.
- Look at prices in several stores. Buy some things in one store and other things in a different store. You can save money when you shop at several supermarkets.
- Use a shopping list, and don't buy things that aren't on vour list!

Ramona Lopez has some important advice for shoppers: "Never shop when you're hungry. People always buy more groceries when they're hungry!"


